1.0 Looking Back: Considering 2023 - 2024

1.1 Emergency Responses

The primary purpose for which the Brigade exists is to provide support services to volunteer and paid firefighters across the Auckland region at emergency incidents, training and community events.

Auckland Operational Support continues to be a very busy volunteer brigade, having attended 564 incidents during the 2023-2024 year. When considering these very high response numbers it is important to also note that this Brigade is only dispatched by Firecom to working incidents. Unlike most volunteer operational brigades, we do not attend false alarms. We continue to be a very busy volunteer fire brigade!

The 564 responses is almost the same total as the previous year (562) but include a 12% increase in Structure Fires. This increase was offset by corresponding reductions in the number of Weather-Related Events and responses to Power Wires Down. This reflects the absence of major storm events which were such a big part of the previous year.

Major and Notable Incidents

Among the responses to fires, MVC's, weather events and other emergencies, I usually list incidents the Brigade attended during the year which stand out as being major or unusual. This year has been one of "business as usual" with a lot of Second Alarm house fires, and some Third Alarm structure fires, but relatively few incidents of special note. Those of note or long duration include:

- Major Gas Leak, Customs St East, CBD (4.5 hours) 24/08/23
- Person in Tree/Possible Self Harm, Longfellow Rd, Glen Eden (8 hours) 07/10/23
- 5th Alarm Structure and Waste Materials fire, Green Gorilla, Victoria St, Onehunga (24.5 hours) 07 & 08/02/24
- Major Vegetation Fire, Kawakawa Bay Rd, Kawakawa Bay (12 hours) 30 & 31/03/24
- Major Vegetation Fire, Kaipara Coast Highway (10.75 hours) 11/04/24




Figure 5 - locations of our 564 turnouts during FY 2023-24

1.3 Member Participation at Incidents - Attendance, Vehicle and Radio Operator Duties

In order to undertake the support services, we provide, it is necessary that every operational member fully participates and contributes to our attendance at incidents which we are dispatched to. Appendix 1 details the level of activity by person measured by:

- Response to incidents
- Radio Operator Duties (number of shifts worked)
- Emergency Driver duties on First Response vehicles (number of shifts rostered on duty)
- Canteen Driver and Assistant duties (number of weeks rostered on duty).

The many hours of time contributed by members, both in being available on-call and in actually attending incidents reflects the enormous commitment given to making the Brigade successful.

1.4 Training

Regular training remains an essential part of the programme in order to ensure member confidence and competence in Operational Support duties and tasks as per OSM, plus some additional skills such as traffic control and Canteen vehicle operation.

Nigel Bernie, Srik Bhaktar, Ricky Dragland and David O'Connor, undertook the Heavy Vehicle ERD course, and Mike Adair, Melani Falaniko, Abel Reyna and Joshua Teal the Light Vehicle ERD course. Given the nature of our operation it takes considerable time and effort to get these drivers through their 12 supervised urgent response drives after course completion.

FF Schellingerhout and our Recruit Firefighters Clarke and Stapleton successfully completed the TAPS course at National Training Centre.

Our Training Team members are all qualified instructors for the OS TAPS course at National Training Centre, so our training programme is of a high standard.

1.5 Honouring Members

Ric Carlyon - Retired after 42 years of Service

Ric joined the Auckland Volunteer Fire Police Corps in 1981. By that time, he was already very well known throughout the NZ Fire Service community, especially in Auckland but also nationally, because of the extensive coverage of "all things fire" which he had provided over many years as a journalist. Ric immediately became a very active and valuable member of the Corps.

With the passing of the then officer in charge, NZFS executives were keen to encourage a modernisation of the Fire Police operation and for it to develop additional roles which would enhance and add value to Fire Service operations across Auckland. Ric was appointed with the rank of Divisional Officer as the OIC Fire Police in 1989. The appropriateness of this appointment was obvious – Ric was a very senior executive manger (Head of TV News and Current Affairs), passionate and active in the Fire Police, and widely known and respected across the NZFS.

So commenced the modernisation and development journey into the highly successful and valued Brigade we have today. His first act was to introduce a rank structure paralleling the rest of the NZFS with the appointment of three Senior Station Officers – John Pendleton, Jim Smith, and Glenn Teal, two of whom followed him in the Brigade OIC role and continued the improvement and development programme which he commenced.

Under Ric's leadership, Brigade meetings and fireground operations became well organised and run. Portfolios and subcommittees were introduced to more systematically and professionally manage matters such as recruitment and training. One of the most significant developments was the expansion of responses to include Motor Vehicle Crashes and associated duties. As a part time Traffic Officer at Mt Albert Borough Council, Ric was well placed to lead this innovation.

Ric left the Brigade in 1996 when his employment took him offshore and rejoined on his subsequent return to NZ. With the change of OIC in 2010, Ric was appointed DCFO, held several portfolios and assisted with implementation of many more changes and improvements to the Brigade operation. During these years Ric was active in the wider fire community with the Auckland Provincial, and the United Fire Brigades' Association. Ric served 6 years as an appointed director of the UFBA.

When Ric started planning for his eventual retirement, a succession plan was implemented whereby he gradually stepped down over several years rather than suddenly relinquishing all leadership roles.

He moved from DCFO to SSO for several years and then to SO prior to retirement in October 2023. In this way his wisdom and experience were retained within the leadership group and were available to new and younger officers as they were appointed and gained experience. During recent years Ric served as Brigade Meetings Secretary.

Ric's contribution to this Brigade has been enormous. His extensive contribution and retirement will be marked at the forthcoming Honours function to be held on 9 November 2024.

His commitment, sense of responsibility, humour, and friendship will be missed.

Glenn Teal – Awarded Membership of the New Zealand Order of Merit

It is an honour and a privilege to have been awarded this Royal Honour for services to FENZ and for services to the community. Although the MNZM has been given to me, in reality it is a recognition of the work of all volunteers in the Auckland Operational Support Unit and the work of many people in the charitable businesses which I am involved in.

The Citation for the Award reads:

For services to Fire and Emergency New Zealand and the community

Mr Glenn Teal has been Chief Fire Officer of the Auckland Operational Support Unit (OSU) since 2010, having joined the preceding Auckland Volunteer Fire Police Corps in 1979.

The Auckland Operational Support Unit (OSU) comprises 60 volunteer members and provides 24/7 support to Fire and Emergency New Zealand (FENZ) personnel and other emergency services across Auckland. Mr Teal's leadership has ensured the seamless operation of the unit across the wide and diverse Super City region. He helped formulate FENZ's first comprehensive basic training and progression system for Operational Support personnel in 2011, still in use today. He was on the committee which instigated a national standard for FENZ Operational Support personnel apparel. He established an Observer Programme to drive recruitment, introducing potential recruits to the unit's in-field activities. He led projects to upgrade the unit's stand-alone radio network, refurbish OSU premises, and replace brigade vehicles in 2023. He mobilised OSU resources to directly assist following the 2010 Christchurch earthquake and during the 2019 Marlborough wildfires. He oversaw measures to ensure the Auckland OSU could continue to provide full support during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Mr Teal has applied his property and investment expertise in voluntary and professional capacities to charities, including the Auckland Baptist Tabernacle Trust Board for 36 years and Laidlaw College Foundation for 18 years.

3.0 Brigade Vehicles

Highest Priority: Replacement of the Ultralite Vehicles.

Both existing Ultralite vehicles are past their useful life. The difficulties in maintaining operational response and maintaining Brigade morale were fully documented in several previous years' reports.

Action was finally initiated following a meeting in March 2023 where we had the opportunity to make a presentation about the situation to the FENZ National Commander Russell Wood, all of the Regional Managers, and DM Vaughan Mackereth.

A funded project has been underway for several months by National Fleet to specify and procure a prototype vehicle for Auckland Operational Support based on the Iveco Daily model. The detailed configuration of the lockers, vehicle stowage etc has been led by the National Fleet Engineer and supported with specific input from 4 of our members who regularly drive our Ultralites (SSO Allan Officer, SSO Richard Cuthbert, SO Chris England and SO Ian Batterbee) and have the most practical experience of our vehicle requirements over the past 10 years. CFO Glenn Teal and DCFO Ross Bay are involved in this Working Group as Brigade management representatives.

Once delivered in October / November, activities will focus on final stowage and equipment replacement. Once ready for service, all urgent qualified and trainee drivers will undertake a structured familiarisation/ induction programme with a view to having the new vehicle in service from Balmoral for the forthcoming summer.

- Nine drivers completed the ERD Course
